

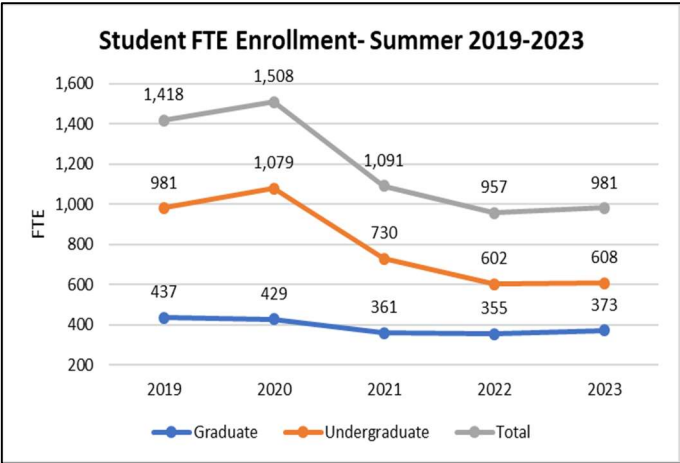
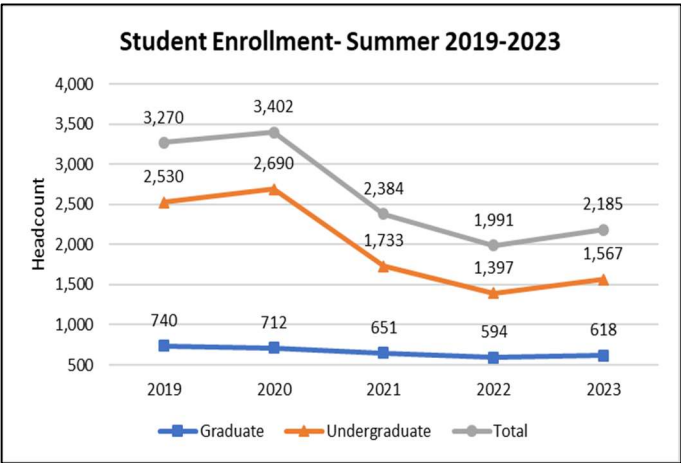


# Institutional Research & Planning Report

## Summer 2023 Enrollment

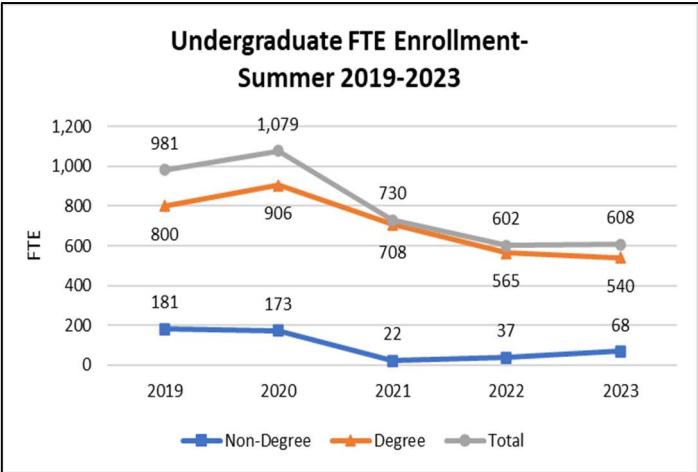
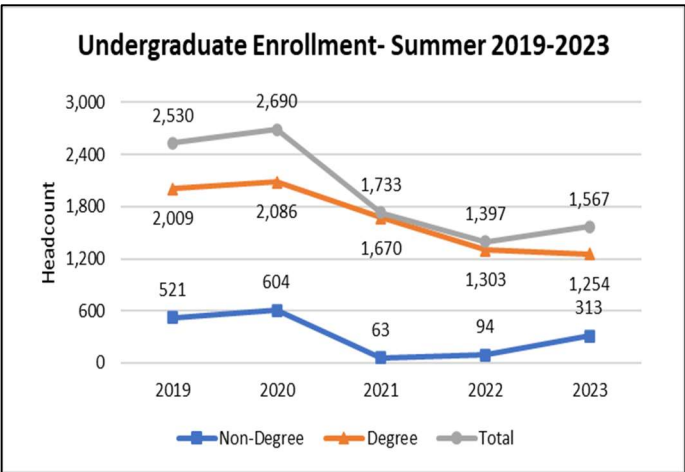
### Overall Enrollment

Total enrollment in summer 2023 was 2,185, a 10% increase from last year’s enrollment of 1,991. Undergraduate enrollment increased by 12%, while graduate enrollment increased by 4%, however these totals are still down from pre-pandemic levels.



### Undergraduate Enrollment

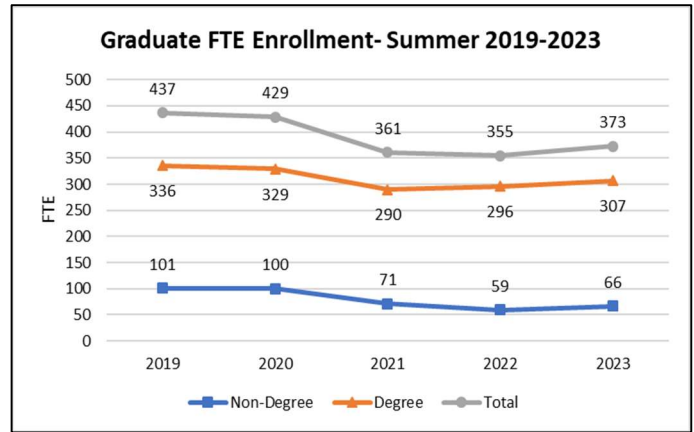
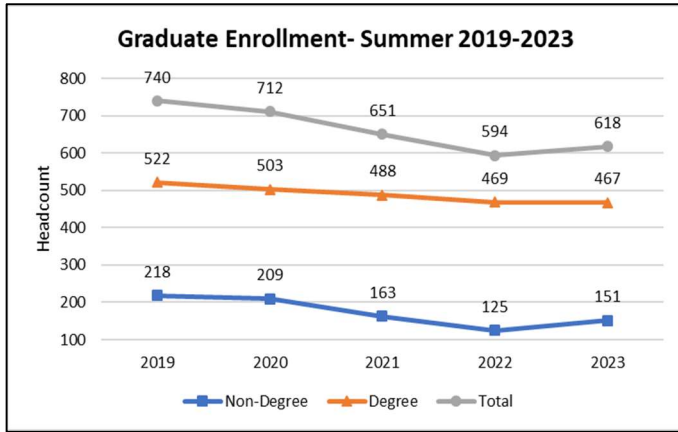
Degree-seeking undergraduate enrollment decreased by 4% from last year. While non-degree-seeking students\* increased by 219 students this year, their total still falls below those from 2019 and 2020.



\*Note: Non-degree-seeking counts include students in certificate programs for both undergraduate and graduate students.

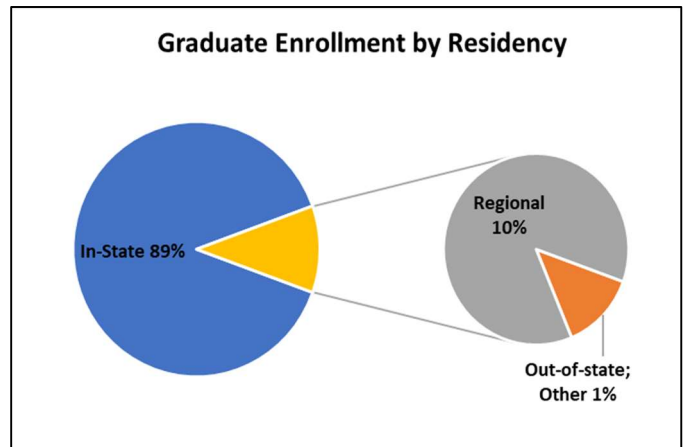
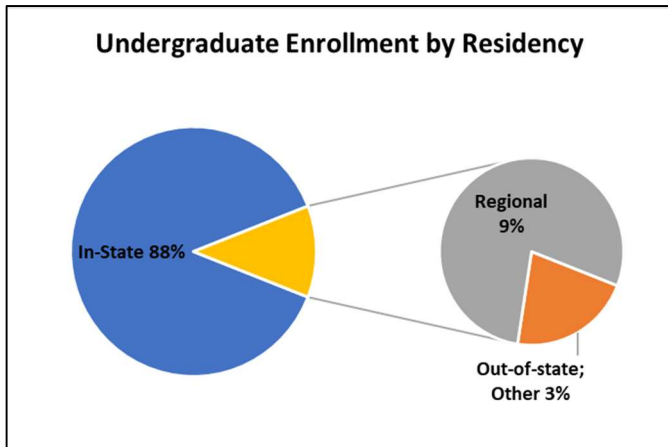
## Graduate Enrollment

Overall graduate enrollment experienced a 4% increase from last summer. Degree-seeking headcount decreased by less than 1% though FTE enrollment was up, indicating an increase in credits per student. Non-degree enrollment showed a large increase of 21% (125 to 151 students), along with an uptick in FTE.



## Enrollment by Residency

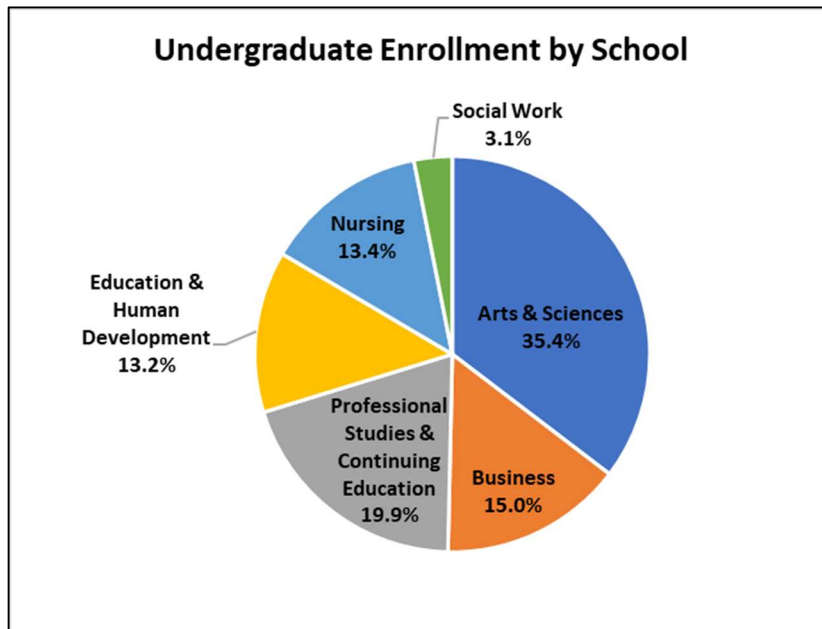
At the undergraduate level, 88% of Summer 2023 students are Rhode Island residents, with the remaining 12% divided between MTP/NEBHE and out-of-state residence. At the graduate level, 89% of students have in-state residence. Traditionally, the percentage of in-state students is higher in the summer than during the academic year and that continues to be the case this year for both undergraduate and graduate students.



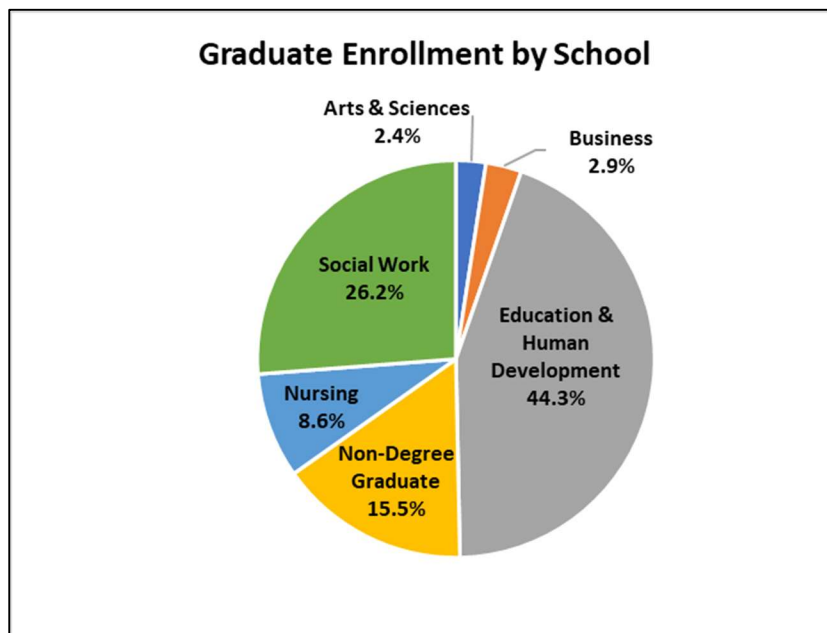
## Enrollment by School

Looking at enrollment by school, 35% of the undergraduate students registered in Summer 2023 were in the Arts and Sciences; 15% were in Business, 13% in Nursing, 13% in Education and Human Development, and 3% in Social Work. The percentage of continuing education students enrolled in the summer is often higher than during the academic year.

This trend holds in Summer 2023, including students in the new Bachelor of Professional Studies which is run through the Office of Professional Studies and Continuing Education.



At the graduate level, the School of Education and Human Development made up 44% of enrollments. The School of Social Work had the second-largest graduate enrollment, 26%, followed by non-degree, unaffiliated students with 15.5%, Nursing with 9%, Business with 3% and Arts and Sciences with 2%. All schools showed an increase in summer enrollment except for Business (-1.4% year-over-year).
